2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Yes, mentors are identified for each class to look after the welfare and addressing the grievances of the students. Counselling is done to the students; each teacher is assigned to group of 10 students for mentoring, guidance, coaching, directions and encouragements during the course. Continuous evaluation system is followed; students are encouraged to face competitive exams like SLET/NET. Journalism teachers facilitate students to develop their skills in news paper, page designing, video editing, photography techniques and producing evening news paper and news bulletin for practical YouTube channel for the sake of professional development. For social work students, the teachers and research scholars shall play the mentoring role in students in their teaching within the department as well as in the agencies outside the university department in which students are expected to undergo 16 hours of training every week during their entire course.

1. Akka TV

Akka TV is practical news channel started and maintained by Department of Journalism and Mass Communication of the Akkamahadevi Women's University, Vijayapura on YouTube platform. It covers news and feature stories related to the university as well as other leading issues of the state and nation. Students are actively participating in all the stages of news bulletin production such as reporting, script writing, voice over, videography, anchoring, visual editing and graphics creation. Students work under the guidance of their mentors.

The news bulletins are released and uploaded to the internet on special occasions. The news channel already reached over 10,000 viewers on YouTube. The bulletins are produced in Jnanavahini Media Studio of the department. The media studio has all the required equipment's to produce the news bulletins. Advanced editing lab is also established for the need of visual editing. This lab is equipped with the modern computers and advanced versions of editing software's such as **Final Cut Pro and Adobe Premiere Pro**.

The department is practicing mentor system in order to give equal opportunity to all the students. Students are divided into six batches and each batch comprised with 6 to 7 students and guided by a Mentor. Each batch of students produces news bulletins on their respective days from Monday to Saturday. They interchange their roles such as anchor, script writer, videographer and visual editor in every week.

The department is also planning to produce live discussions, interviews, and special lectures etc on Akka TV. In many special occasions, students are interviewed eminent personalities and journalists. Akka TV news bulletins are widely appreciated by the media professionals and faculties of other universities.

1. Women Technology Park

i. Paper Recycling

Waste paper recycling machine is used to make used paper turn into new paper. The used paper can be books, newspapers, corrugated cardboard boxes and so on. We are having paper recycling unit functioning under **Koushalya Technology Park**. The main objectives of this unit are to provide the required skills for manufacturing the recycled products to the students and to encourage the manufacture of recycled products like Files, Envelopes, Letter heads, etc by using Waste Papers.

Using secondary fibre to make paper can reduce the usage of wood pulp and consumption of forest. It is a good way to maintain the ecological balance and reduce environment pollution. During the year 2017-18, the Unit has produced 6067 Files by using Waste Papers.

ii. Food Processing: Millet Based Nutritious Food Products

Department is connected with nutrition and health; faculty members are engaged in delivering series of nutrition education lectures to the students of various departments of the university. In addition to this, the faculty members are delivering nutrition awareness lectures to the pregnant and lactating women as well as medical students on the request by Al-Ameen Medical College and Hospital, Vijayapura.

The department has organized the National Nutrition Week programme in collaboration with Dept. of Home Science, BLDEA.s Smt. Bangaramma Sajjan Arts and Commerce College for Women. Further, the National Nutrition Week programme was also conducted in Government Urdu School, Vijayapura. For the exhibition at Mysore Dasara Festival, the healthy nutritious millet-based food products were prepared from the Ananya Food Processing Center and department and presented to Hon. Higher Education Minister and Vice Chancellors of State Universities.

iii. Bio Diesel

Bio-diesel and DC Centre is working from 10th July 2010. 3000 plantations of ponagamia, Neem and simarouba. Diesel production per month is 100 litres. The production is used to university vehicles and tractors. In the academic year 2017-18 the total quantity of seeds used were 2840 Kgs. Total quantity of oil obtained were 245 litres. Total quantity of cake obtained were 2462 kgs. Total quantity of bi- diesel obtained were 210 Litres. Total quantity of glycerine obtained 35

Kgs.

Information regarding the benefits of Bio-Diesel has been disseminated to various farmers and localities. Demonstrations and Sales Centres were set at fairs and conferences. Information brochure was published for disseminating information. University website is used to highlight the programmes and developments of Bio-Diesel Unit.

4. The PG Departments of the university shall be encouraging to organise at least one seminar/workshop to enhance the quality of teaching, learning and research.
5. At least two workshops will be conducted for teachers for their capacity building.

6. “Mahila Dhvani” i.e., a Portal Media will be started by next academic year 2018-19.
7. Multi-Disciplinary E-Journal shall be started.
8. Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability and Alternate Energy initiatives such as: Solar Light Grid at University Campus.
9. Production capacity of Bio Diesel unit in the university will be enhanced and dissemination of Bio- diesel information to students and Public will be increased.
10. Training programmes for the farmers and localities will be implemented in the next year.
11. To plant minimum 5000 saplings in the campus through NSS Unit and Departments to make campus Eco-Friendly.
12. Special skill development programmes to motivate the differently abled students to pursue higher education.
13. More number of Institutions, Industry and Community interaction programmes will be conducted.
14. To increase the renewable energy up to 35,000 units by next Academic Year from the Present 10,000 units.
