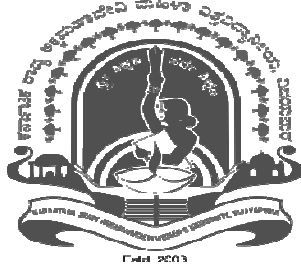

## DESCRIPTION OF THE EMBLEM

A woman with a book in hand and a pen in the other is the very incarnation of self-confidence. This is the emblem of Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University, Vijayapura. The Lamps symbolize knowledge. The Hands denote Akkamahadevi and Chand Bi Bi, two women of this region who crusaded for the upliftment of women. The Seven bangles in the hand represent the seven colors emerging unified as a ray of light. The bangles in the left hand represent the Panchabhutas. The rainbow behind the Women holding a pen aloft represents the rainbow of promises; the figure of the Arch in the background stands for the architectural heritage of Bijapur, the GolGumbaz to its right and the Anubhava Mantap to its left herald the religious harmony and history of Vijayapura. The peepul tree and the coconut tree, which form a halo around the arch, symbolize enlightenment and prosperity.

The Structure supporting all these signifies the mythological Adishesha who believed to be upholding the earth. The dancing lines are metaphorical of femininity, Gestaltic, the picture reminds us of the Buddha in deep meditation, and the motto is education for women is education for all.

  - i. The credit assigned to the PhD course work shall be a minimum of 08 credits and a maximum of 16 credits.
  - ii. The course work shall be treated as prerequisite for Ph.D. preparation. A minimum of four credits shall be assigned to one or more courses on Research Methodology which could cover areas such as quantitative methods, Computer Applications, research ethics and review of published research the relevant field, training, field work, etc. Other courses shall be advanced level courses preparing the students for PhD degree.
  - iii. Course work will be for a minimum period of one term of sixteen-week duration (minimum 90 working days).

At the end the first term there shall be a term end examination as outlined below

- iv. All courses prescribed for M.Phil. and PhD course work shall be in conformity with the credit hour instructional requirement and shall specify content, instructional and assessment methods. They shall be duly approved by the authorized academic bodies.
- v. The department where the scholar pursues her research shall prescribe the course(s) to her based on the recommendations of the Research Advisory Committee.
- vi. All candidates admitted to the M.Phil and PhD programmes shall be required to complete the coursework prescribed by the department during the initial one or two semesters.
- vii. Candidates already holding M.Phil degree and admitted to the PhD programme, or those who have already completed the course work in M.Phil and have been permitted to proceed to the PhD in integrated course, may be exempted by the



department from the PhD course work. Such an M.Phil degree was obtained in adherence to 'UGC [Minimum Standards and Procedures for Awards of M.Phil/ PhD Programmes] Regulations - 2009'. The Research Advisory Committee after verifying the facts may recommend exemption certificate to be given to the candidate. All other candidates admitted to the PhD programme shall be required to complete the PhD course work prescribed by the department.

- viii. Teaching shall be confined only to paper on 'Research Methodology'. The weekly teaching hours for that paper shall be four hours. Another four hours per week shall be devoted to discussion with the candidates on other course. The recognized guides shall teach the course.
- ix. The candidates admitted to the Ph.D. programme shall keep a minimum attendance of 75% of the classes conducted irrespective of part time or full time.
- x. Grades in the course work, including research methodology courses shall be finalized after a combined assessment by the Research Advisory Committee and the Department and the final grades shall be communicated to the university.
- xi. A PhD scholar has to obtain a minimum of 55% of marks or its equivalent grade in the UGC 7-point scale (or an equivalent grade/ CGPA in a point scale wherever grading system is followed) in the course work in order to be eligible to continue in the programme and submit the thesis.
- h.** Policy for procurement of examination related materials such as answer books, marks card, degree certificates, rank certificates, provisional certificates.: by Calling E-tender

4. Director of Physical Education organized meeting of all the Directors of Physical Education of various affiliated colleges of KSAW University, on 20.08.2018.
5. Students of the University participated in 14 Sports/ Games in All India/ Inter-university Tournaments.
6. Students of the university participated in 18 Sports/ Games in Inter-collegiate tournaments.

#### **Directorate of Student Welfare**

1. The 15<sup>th</sup> Foundation Day of the University was celebrated on 21 June 2018. Prof. S. G. Siddharamaiah, Chairman, Kannada Abhivruddhi Pradhikara, Bangalore had been the Chief Guest on the occasion. Prizes were given to the best college magazines published by the affiliated colleges of the University.
2. An Inter-collegiate Speech Competition was held on 7 September 2018 under the joint collaboration of DSW and Sahakar Mahamandal, Bangalore. The winners of the competition were further nominated for a state level debate competition.
3. 'Spandana' an induction programme was held on 18<sup>th</sup> Sept 2018 in order to welcome the first year students of all the departments of the university. The Chief Guest Smt. Bhuvaneshwari Hegde delivered a lecture on personality development of girl students on this occasion.
4. The Inter-collegiate Youth Festival 2018-19 was held at Akkamahadevi Women's College, Bailhongal on 22, 23 and 24 September 2018. Around 800 students from 31 different colleges actively participated in this Youth Festival.
5. South Zone Level Youth Festival was held at Shri Padmavati Women's University (SPMVV) from 7 to 11 October 2018. Our students participated in this event. Kum. Saraswati Sabarad secured second price in light vocal and Kum. Akshata Irale (of Soma Subhadramma Ramanagouda Women's College, Raichur) secured 2<sup>nd</sup> Place in Rangoli Competition.
6. An election of all the class representatives was held on 19<sup>th</sup> November 2018 and representatives from 5 departments were elected. On 9 Feb 2019 the committee of student representatives was inaugurated. A dialogue was also held between the student

representatives, research scholars and the Vice Chancellor for the development of University.

7. On 1 December 2018, our students participated in the procession to bring awareness among people about HIV/AIDS on the occasion of World AIDS Day.
8. A team of students from our University participated in the National Level Inter - university Youth Festival held Chandigarh from 1 to 5 February 2019. Kum. Saraswati Sabarad secured second place in Light Vocal and Kum. Akshata Irale (of Soma Subhadramma Ramanagouda Women's College, Raichur) secured fourth rank in Rangoli competition.
9. Kannada University, Hampi had organised a State level Inter-collegiate Debate Competition for UG and PG students on 13 February 2019. Four Students of our University had participated in this and Kum. Gloria D'Souza (of SJMVS Women's College, Hubli) secured 2<sup>nd</sup> rank and Kum. Supriya (of Viramma Gangasiri Women's College, Kalburgi) secured fourth place.
10. In the third week of March, Election Awareness Programmes had been organised CEP Zilla Panchayat, Vijayapura in which our university students had participated.
11. A free health check-up camp was organised by DSW, Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University, Vijayapur, in collaboration with LUQMAN UNANI, MEDICAL Course & Hospital, Vijayapur. This was held at Hostel-I from 11 am to 4 pm on 29 and 30 March 2019 in which a total of 200 students got themselves checked up.
12. A free eye check-up camp was organised by DSW, Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University, Vijayapura, in collaboration with Anuragha Eye Hospital, Vijayapura for the benefits of students. This was held at Hostel-1 from 11 am to 4 pm on 31 March 2019 and a total of 200 students got their eyes checked up for free.

### **NSS Cell**

1. In 2018-19, Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University had 90 NSS Units in 57 affiliated colleges.
2. In 2018-19, 60 new NSS units in 31 affiliated colleges including BEd and new colleges were added to KSAWU. These units worked under State Government Grants.
3. In 2018-19, the State Government sanctioned a special grant of Rs. 15,00,000/- (Fifteen lakhs) for the daily activities of NSS. NSS Cell Distributed a grant of Rs. 7,75,200/- to 51 out of 60 units.
4. In 2018-19, the State Government sanctioned a Special Grant of Rs.13,50,000/- (Thirteen Lakhs Fifty thousand) for Special Camp. Grant of Rs. 11,47,500/- was distributed among 51 out of 60 units.
5. In this year, State Government sanctioned an additional grant of Rs. 7,90,000/- (Seven lakhs Ninty thousand) for Special Camp. In this grant each unit would get Rs.10,000/-, and hence we distributed the amount Rs. 7,70,000/- (Seven lakhs Seventy thousand) among 77 Units.

6. In 2018-19, the Central Government sanctioned Rs. 16,80,205/-. But they have sanctioned 70% of grant Rs. 9,57,600/- for the regular activities of 90 units. This was also distributed instead among 89 out of 90 units.
7. In 2018-19, the Central Government sanctioned Rs. 19,26,742/- But only 70% of the grant was released (Rs. 13,48,719/-) for Special Camp. Instead of 90 units, 88 units received the grant. A grant of Rs. 13,70,250/- was distributed among 56 NSS units Colleges.
8. On 28 October 2018, 10 Volunteers and one Programme Officer participated in an Adventure Camp held at Kulu and Manali in Himachal Pradesh. Volunteers were from various BEd college and other affiliated colleges.
9. In 2018-19, NSS Cell Conducted 88 Special Camps in all the colleges with NSS unit which are affiliated to the University.
10. All affiliated colleges of the University actively participated in tree plantation programme by planting 6,500 plants.
11. Affiliated colleges with NSS unit conducted a total of 25 Blood Donation Camps and 50 camps for free health chekup.
12. Affiliated colleges with NSS units have perfectly followed the Programme Swachha Bharat Abhiyan.
13. University NSS Cell conducted Young Leadership Training Programme dated: 25-03-2019 to 31-03-2019 in the University Campus. There were 450 volunteers and 20 officers.

**OBC Cell**

The cell works in collaboration with different P.G. Departments of the university. It is an innovative cell of the university funded by UGC through which the OBC and minority students get an opportunity to enhance their communication skills, soft skills and to have a career of their choice. The cell is managed by the Coordinator along with two supporting staff. Equal Opportunity Cell is functioning in the University, focusing on the upliftment of the weaker sections in the Students community. Under the guidance of the staff members, Equal Opportunity Cell provides academic, personal and psychological support to the students.

**Functions:**

- We have submitted a proposal to Back ward class commission Bangalore for the construction of OBC Hostel.
- 103<sup>rd</sup> Birth Anniversary of the former Chief Minister D. Devaraj Urs' was organized on 17-09-2018. In this function, the Chief Guest, Sri Mahadev Prakash, Senior Press Reporter, delivered a special lecture on 'Ethics of Sri D. Devaraj Urs'. President of the function, Prof. Sabiha Boomigowda, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor of the university spoke about D. Devaraj Urs.
- In the year 2018-19 a total of 681 OBC students were benefitted of Fee concession Amount Rs. 1,00,68,067/- in both the formats (Cheques and Account transfer).
- In the year 2018-19 a total of 31 Research Scholars applied for Research Scholarships & 24 students got a sanction of Rs.14,40,000/-.

**SC/ST Cell:**

The University Grants Commission (UGC) has given priority to the downtrodden students and staff members during IX plan period and given direction to all the universities to establish SC/ST Cell.

1. The SC/ST Cell at Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University was constituted in the year 2003.
2. After the establishment of the Cell in the university, it specifically concentrated on the welfare of the SC/ST students, Research scholars and Staff members.
3. The main aim of the cell is to monitor the guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission and by the department of Ministry of Social Welfare Government of Karnataka from time to time.

**Vision:**

To be an institution of excellence in higher education that continually responds to the changing social realities through the development and application of knowledge, towards creating a people-centered and ecologically sustainable society that promotes and protects the dignity, equality, social justice and human rights for all, with special emphasis on marginalised and vulnerable groups.

**Mission:**

In pursuance of its vision, Karnataka State Akkamahadevi Women's University, Jnanashakti Campus Vijayapur organizes teaching programmes to facilitate the development of

competent and committed professionals for practice, research and teaching, develops and disseminates knowledge through extension activities at the local, regional, national and international levels.

### **Functions of the SC/ST Cell**

1. The SC/ST Cell is giving wide publicity through circulars to all the faculties and informs the students about the various scholarships, namely, Post-Metric Scholarship, Karnataka Higher Education Special Scholarship, Meritorious Scholarship, P.G. Women Scholarship, Rajiv Gandhi National Fellowship, P.G. Scholarship for professional courses, ICMR, CSIR, ICSSR and other scholarships, and fellowships.
2. The SC/ST Cell has taken up the problems of the SC/ST students and employees with the university authorities and has solved some of them amicably. The cell, in the ultimate analysis, has been user friendly counsellors to all SC/ST employees and students.
3. The SC/ST Cell is also helping the SC/ST Research Scholars in getting the University Fellowship from the university and from the state government.
4. The Cell is implementing various schemes of the University Grants Commission with the objective to improve the learning levels of Schedule Caste and Schedule Tribe candidates to bring them up to the general level of the other communities.
5. The University is providing statistical information periodically and promptly on all aspects to the Government of India and the State Government.
6. The SC/ST Cell provides guidance to various University Committees in respect of promotions/ recruitment for the latest rule position concerning SC/ST reservations.
7. The Cell takes due care in establishing the Book Bank and Book Grants for the SC/ST students of the university. The Cell also advises the students to utilize the facilities of the Book Bank and to borrow books depending on availability.
8. The cell established the competitive coaching academy for the effective training and coaching for various competitive exams conducted by the UPSC, KPSC, PO, Railways, NET, SLET, TET for teachers, etc.
9. The cell is regularly distributing the laptops to all the PG and Research scholars.

9. To train SC/ST research scholars and PG students for competitive examinations conducted by KPSC/ UPSC/ NET/ SLET a training center is established by the SC/ST Cell.
10. The SC/ST Cell has reimbursed Admission fees, examination fees, Hostel fess and other fees of SC/ST UG (B.Ed and B.P.Ed) and PG students of our university..
11. All India educational study tour has been organized for SC/ST UG (B.Ed and B.P.Ed) PG students of our university by the SC/ST Cell.
12. The existing facilities were made available by the cell in main campus of our university are extended to PG Centers viz., Mandya Extension Centre and Sindhanoor PG centre.
13. Computer laboratory is being established in the PG centre, Sindhnoor for the benefit of SC/ST PG students of the centre.
14. Skill development trainings are conducted periodically for the SC/ST UG (B.Ed and B.P.Ed), PG and Research scholars of our university.
15. A Modular modern kitchen has been constructed in Dr. Babu Jagjivan Ram hostel of our University.
16. Programmes are conducted on life and achievements of personalities like Mahatma Budha, Mahatma Basava, Dr. B.R.Ambedkar, Mahatma Jyotiba Phule and Savitribai Phule to enlighten the SC/ST students.
17. Conducted classes on Spoken English, writing skill, grammr and presentation skill for SC/ST students by SC/ST Cell.
18. An orientation programme of Research Methodology and Statistics is conducted by SC/ST Cell for the benefit of SC/ST Research scholars of the university.
19. The SC/ST Cell has reimbursed expenses born by SC/ST students of our university towards Dissertation preparation, project work, Work book preparation, uniforms, training courses and subject wise educational study tours conducted by departments of our university.
20. A language lab has been established by SC/ST Cell of our university.
21. The SC/ST Cell regularly organizes National/ International Conferences and Workshops.

22. Various competitions viz., Essay writing, Elocution, Singing, etc. are being sponsored by the SC/ST Cell in order to celebrate 128<sup>th</sup> Birth Anniversary of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar in affiliated colleges of our university.

#### 40. **Best Practices:**

1. **Akka TV** - The YouTube channel streams and uploads bulletins daily on the current issues as well as events taking place in the department. The content specifically focuses on women issues and success stories. Each day a group of students works to prepare the content headed by a staff member. The students have been lauded for releasing of the bulletin immediately after any major event for example Meet the Press with P. Sainath at Bidar. The development journalist appreciated the timeliness of the students in coming up with the package.
2. **Mahila Dhwani**- The two page newspaper is a daily issue rigorously worked by the students spearheaded by a staff member who acts as the mentor. In tune with the Akka TV, the students write and focus on the current issues as well as the major happenings in the University campus. It is uploaded in the official Facebook page of the department- KSAWU Media Cell everyday and gets enormous feedback from the followers for its content and timeliness. The newspaper has been released by the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of the University as well as stalwarts from various fields and received tremendous appraisal.
3. **Media Content Analysis**- The media content analysis class regularly conducts newspaper reading session which includes discussion on the current topics and analysing it.
4. **Mentorship**- The students are divided into groups and are mentored by each staff member for professional guidance as well as removing their obstacles in academics.
5. **Birthday Garden concept** has been adopted in which there is a practice of planting a tree on the birthday of every staff member (Teaching and Non-Teaching). The garden is full of plants which inculcates and promotes the value of nurturing Mother Earth.
6. **Field Visits:** A few departments such as Journalism and Mass Communication, Social Work and Women's Studies organise frequent visits to various places where the practical experience of the students during the field visits help them internalize what they learn in the theory classes.
7. **Special Lectures**- Several departments organise special lectures by inviting prominent dignitaries from the field of academics. These special lectures help the students to have a broad perspective.
